NATIONAL CHILDREN'S DENTAL HEALTH MONTH STRESSES BENEFITS OF SEALANTS

JOLIET, IL – The Will County Health Department (WCHD) and the Will County Community Health Center (CHC) is joining the American Dental Association (ADA) in the observance of National Children's Dental Health Month.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) tooth decay is one of the most common chronic diseases of childhood, and it is largely preventable.

This year CHC and the ADA are emphasizing the positive role that sealants can play in a child's oral health.

According to Dr. Sangita Garg, Chief Dental Officer of the CHC, "sealants can keep cavities from forming and may even stop early stages of decay from becoming a full-blown cavity."

Sealants are protective coatings applied to the chewing surface of back teeth. While sealants have been, according to Dr. Garg, "shown to reduce the risk of decay by nearly 80% in molars," sealants are not a substitute for regular brushing and flossing.

The CDC states that "school-age children without sealants have almost three times more cavities than children with sealants."

Sealants are applied quickly and painlessly at one's dental office and are appropriate for children starting at age five, with the first appearance of permanent molars.

According to the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), sealants may last five years or longer and should be checked regularly and reapplied if necessary.

The CHC offers a variety of dental services including comprehensive dental exams, simple surgical extractions, regular and deep cleaning, digital and panoramic x-rays, fluoride treatment, oral hygiene education, emergency care and the application of sealants.

The following are some basic tips from IDPH to promote good oral health:

Babies

- Clean teeth with a soft, clean cloth or a baby's toothbrush.
- Avoid putting babies to bed with a bottle, and check teeth regularly for spots and stains.

Toddlers to Teens

- Brush teeth with a fluoride toothpaste; floss between teeth.
- Eat healthy foods and limit sweet snacks and drinks. This includes power drinks.
- Schedule regular dental check-ups.
